

Great Wakering Overview

- Total Population of the Parish is 5,587
 - An increase from 5,512 in 2001
 - Population density of 5.5 people per hectare (ppha) slightly higher than the Rochford average of 4.9 ppha
- The average age of a Great Wakering resident is 41.1 years, slightly higher than the national average of 39.3 years
- Between 2001 and 2011, the number of dwellings in the Parish has increased from 2,170 to 2,286





Education Overview

- □ 1 Primary School in the Parish:
 - Great Wakering Primary School
 - Capacity in 2014/15 = 420
 - Number of students in 2014/15 = 412
 - The school currently has a surplus of capacity of 8 students
 - Projected Capacity in 2019/20 = 420
 - Projected number of students in 2019/20 = 381
 - The school is projected to have an increased surplus of capacity of 39 students by 2020

Business Overview

- Within Great Wakering Parish there are 112 rating assessed businesses
- Great Wakering Parish has a good mix of business uses, for example; Offices, Retail, Workshops, Warehouses etc.
 - Are there any attractive business uses missing?
 - What can be done to attract these kind of businesses?





Infrastructure Overview

- Public Transport provision:
 - No train station within Parish boundary
 - Arriva Bus service number 4, 4A,14 runs up to 4 buses an hour to Rochford, Southend and villages in between
 - Other routes run infrequently; 7,63, 807,808,809,811,814
 - Car use still high
- Broadband is generally available across the Parish
 - Maximum advertised Fibre speed of 76 mbps (Central Great Wakering), the same as the 76mbps advertised for Rochford





Health Overview

- □ Great Wakering residents currently have access to a medical centre within their Parish
- 81% of residents would rate their general health as being 'good' to 'very good'¹
 - This is up from 72% in 2001
 - Compares to the national average of 81%

Current Allocations up to 2025

□ Policy SER9 – West Great Wakering
□ Two allocated sites within the policy
□ Land to the south of the High Street (8.5 hectares)
□ Land to the west of Little Wakering Road (4.5 hectares)
□ These sites are to be delivered up to 2025 Applications for these sites have been recently received by our Development Management Officers.
□ A third site situated on Star Lane Brickworks, to build 116 dwellings is currently underway with;
□ 56 market houses already under construction
□ 11 affordable homes under construction


