

Rawreth Overview

- Total Population of the Parish is 1,126
 - An increase from 974 in 2001
 - Population density of 0.99 people per hectare (ppha), much lower than the Rochford average of 4.9 ppha
- The average age of a Rawreth resident is 41.3 years, higher than the national average of 39.3 years
- Between 2001 and 2011, the number of dwellings in the Parish has slightly increased from 389 to 405





Education Overview

- There is no longer a school within the Rawreth Parish, and so children attend schools in neighbouring parishes
- Statistics on school capacity are produced by Essex County Council annually but on a rolling 5-year basis
- These statistics do consider the impact of future housing developments within the 5-year period, but not those which will be completed after
- These statistics are updated annually, most recently covering the period 2015-2020

Business Overview

- Within Rawreth Parish there are 158 rating assessed businesses
- □ Rawreth Parish has a mix of business uses, including: Offices, Retail, Workshops, Leisure centre, Storage etc.
 - But are there any attractive business uses missing?
 - What can be done to attract these kind of businesses?
 - What can be done to maintain or enhance existing businesses?





Infrastructure Overview

- Public Transport provision:
 - Bus services numbers 1, 1B, 3, 3A, 3B, 3C, 3D, 3E, 11A, 94B, 503, 504, 513 run to Rawreth, travelling to Rayleigh, Canvey, Southend, Chelmsford, Rettendon, Wickham Bishops and Oxney Green.
 - The relatively rural/suburban nature of the Parish means car use remains high

Utilities

- Generally available across the Parish however more rural areas may not have access
- Broadband is available across the majority of the Parish
 - Standard Broadband Speed is advertised as up to 17 mbps, however the estimated speed is 1 mbps, lower than the district average
 - Maximum advertised Fibre speed (where available) is 76 mbps, lower than the 76mbps advertised for the district. Speeds in reality will be much lower and vary by location.
 - SuperFast Essex has identified an area either side of the A1245 covering all
 of Rawreth Village and surrounding areas. These areas are scheduled for an
 upgrade to their Fibre Broadband, due between June 2017 to July 2018





Health Overview

- Rawreth residents currently have to leave their parish to access a General Practitioner and other basic healthcare facilities
- 84% of Rawreth residents would rate their general health as being 'good' to 'very good'¹
 - This is up from 74% in 2001
 - Slightly higher than the national average of 81%


